



The Education for All Handicapped Children Act (P.L. 94-142) of 1975 and the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act (IDEA) (P. L. 101-476) have identified specific categories of disabilities under which children may be eligible for special education and related services. These categories are listed in the table below.

Those categories in which BrainWare could be expected to be helpful are highlighted.

Category of Disability	BrainWare Safari is likely to be helpful	Impact of BrainWare Safari
<b>Autism</b>	√	<b>Case studies have shown effectiveness for ASD children between 9 and 12. All diagnosis have shown improvement but Asperger's and High Functioning were most successful.</b>
Deafness		<i>BrainWare's auditory exercises require a small amount of hearing.</i>
Deaf-Blindness		<i>Both sight and hearing are required to use the program.</i>
<b>Hearing Impairment</b>	√	<b>If the impairment is corrected with a hearing aid, the program should have significant benefit.</b>
<b>Mental Retardation</b>	√	<b>Milder cases may derive some benefit.</b>
<b>Multiple Disabilities</b>	√	<b>Case studies have shown that there is some benefit but it is much more difficult for children with multiple disabilities.</b>
<b>Orthopedic Impairment</b>	√	<b>BrainWare Safari could have significant impact on those able to operate a computer or those who have assistance in using a computer.</b>
<b>Health Impairments</b>	√	<b>If the child has enough strength to do the program, some benefit is possible.</b>
Serious Emotional Disturbance		<i>The current program will be difficult for most of these students to use.</i>
<b>Specific Learning Disability</b>	√	<b>Significant benefit would be expected from use.</b>
<b>Speech or Language impairment</b>	√	<b>Such students would be expected to derive significant benefit.</b>
<b>Traumatic Brain Injury</b>	√	<b>Significant impact would likely be observed, depending on the nature of the brain injury</b>
Visual Impairment		<i>BrainWare Safari is highly visual and would be difficult for these students to benefit from in its current form.</i>
